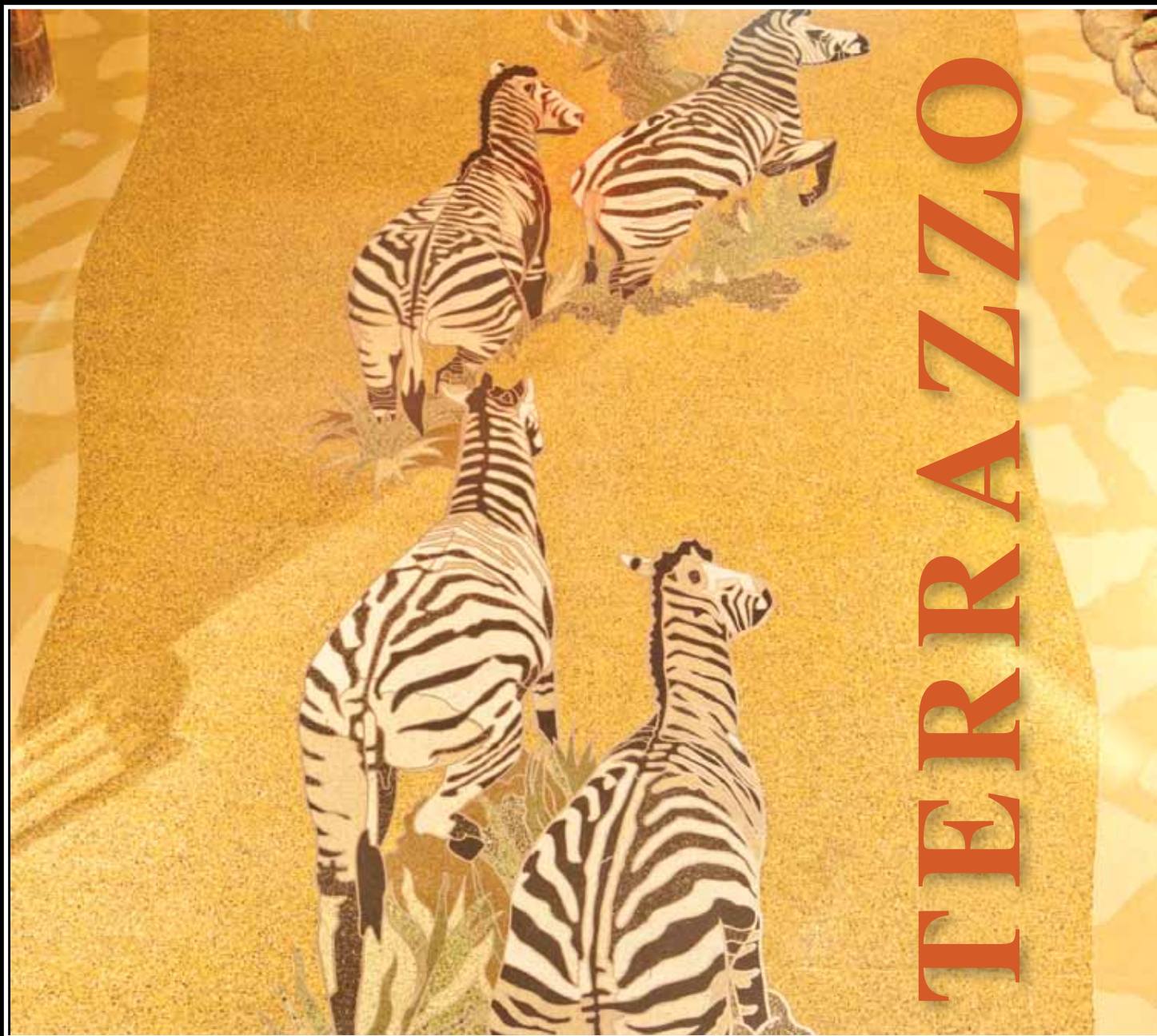

Emmanuel College/ Roberson Hall – Franklin Springs, GA

A great spreading oak tree is the centerpiece of the urban lodge-style commons area of this hall. The tree trunk shows a cross section of growth rings in terrazzo, alternating with water-jet cut Kempas marble, a rich golden-red stone with a striated, wood-grain pattern. Over 800 hand-set pieces of Emperador Dark marble in palladiana terrazzo depict the bark of the tree branches. The emblematic fish from early Christian art and other images in water-jet cut aluminum or stone, with aggregates of mother-of-pearl and metal shavings, are expertly incorporated in the walkway to reflect the heart and legacy of the college.

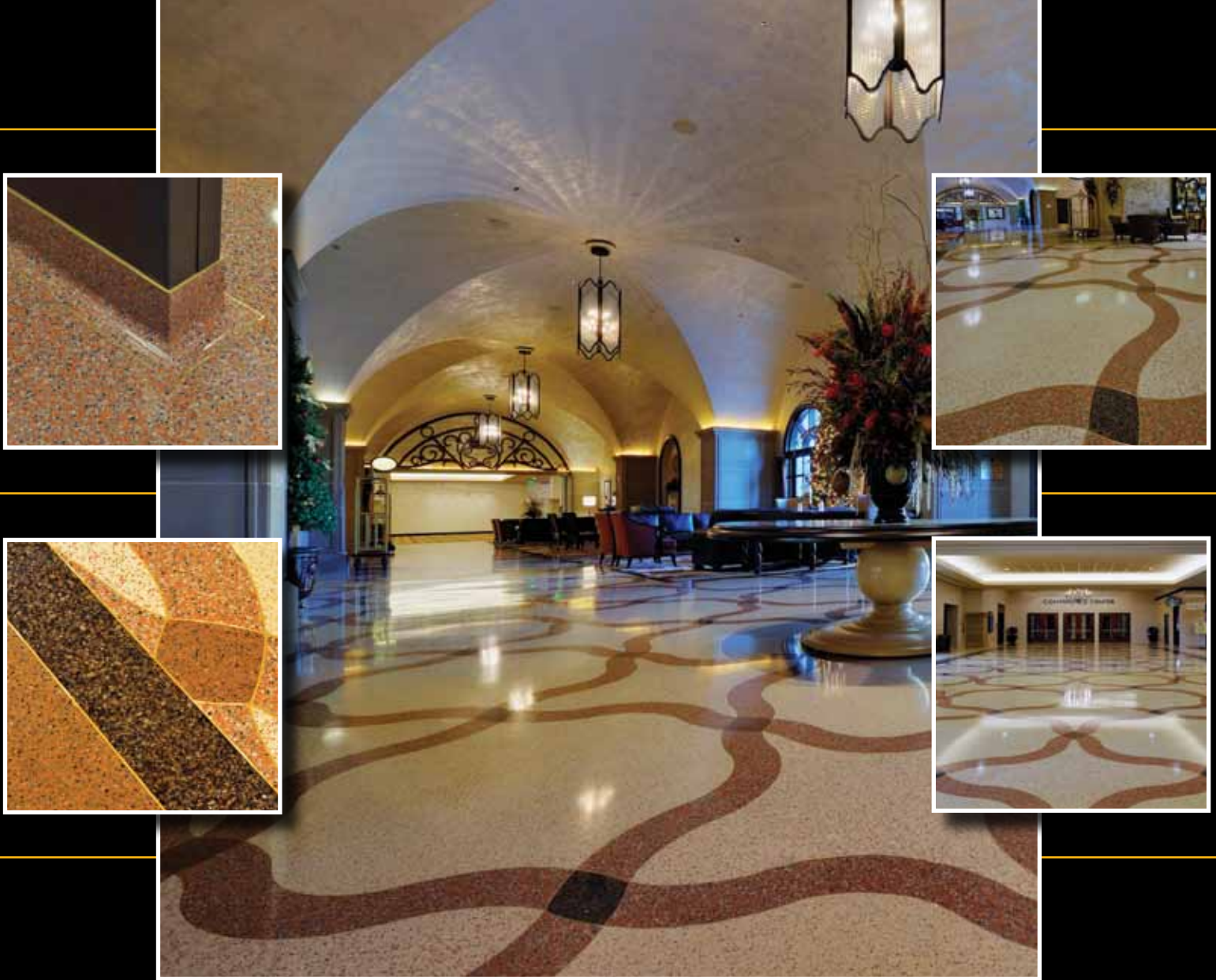

Casino Del Sol – Tucson, AZ

Compiled from five different colors, with glass, natural marble and mother-of-pearl aggregates, this three-eighths inch epoxy terrazzo floor incorporates a “chain link” design of elegant simplicity. Brass divider strips add to its refined luxury. The floor was ground and polished to a finish tolerance of one-sixteenth inch for high sheen and reflection of light. Throughout the 15,000 square feet of terrazzo, thousands of lineal feet of poured-in-place terrazzo cove base implement multiple colors and extend six inches up the face of the walls.

Spring Branch Elementary School – Houston, TX

Terrazzo was selected for its durability and capacity for intricate design on this impressive installation of sand cushion terrazzo. This LEED-certified project orchestrated 18 different colors of terrazzo with 22 different types of aggregate. Designed to serve as a teaching tool, the floor depicts historical community events through maps and timelines and represents local geography along with words of inspiration.

A central medallion within a traditional checkerboard pattern serves as the centerpiece of the design for this elegant terrazzo lobby, mezzanine and central staircase. Reflected against the dome of the ceiling, the medallion's design includes polished inlaid marble, complex geometric shapes and scientific icons set within the thin-set epoxy terrazzo in six shades.

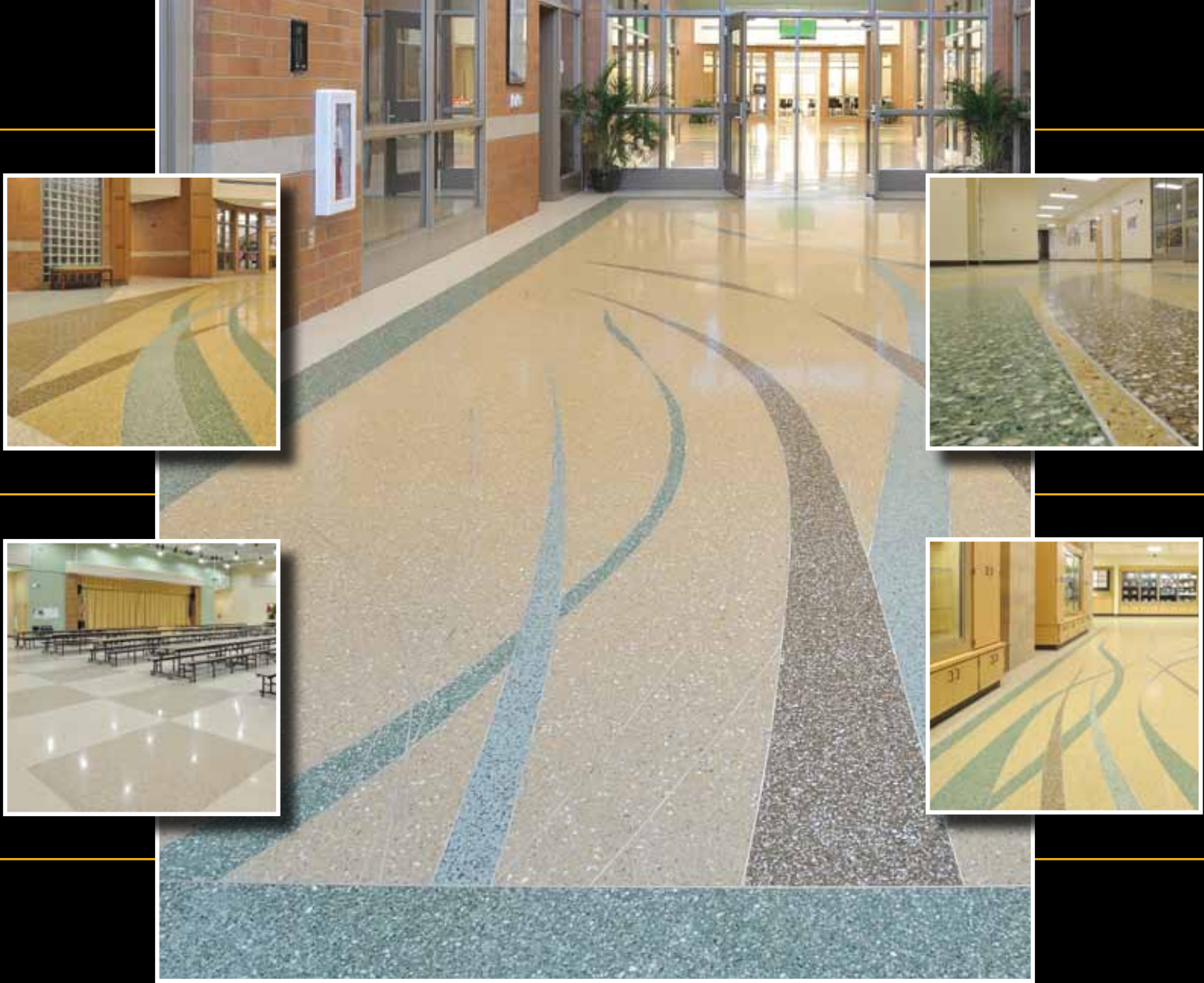

Meadow Glen Elementary School – Lexington, SC

The goals of installing a sustainable floor that would reflect the natural environment while providing a calm, interactive learning space were accomplished at this school. This organic, floor-in-motion design captures the wind with curves in brushed aluminum divider strips and a pattern of free flowing meadow grasses in earth tones. Precast stairs and base join the facility's durable, low-maintenance finishes. Artistic floor installations in the area's school districts are growing along with the reputation of terrazzo as a flooring of choice.

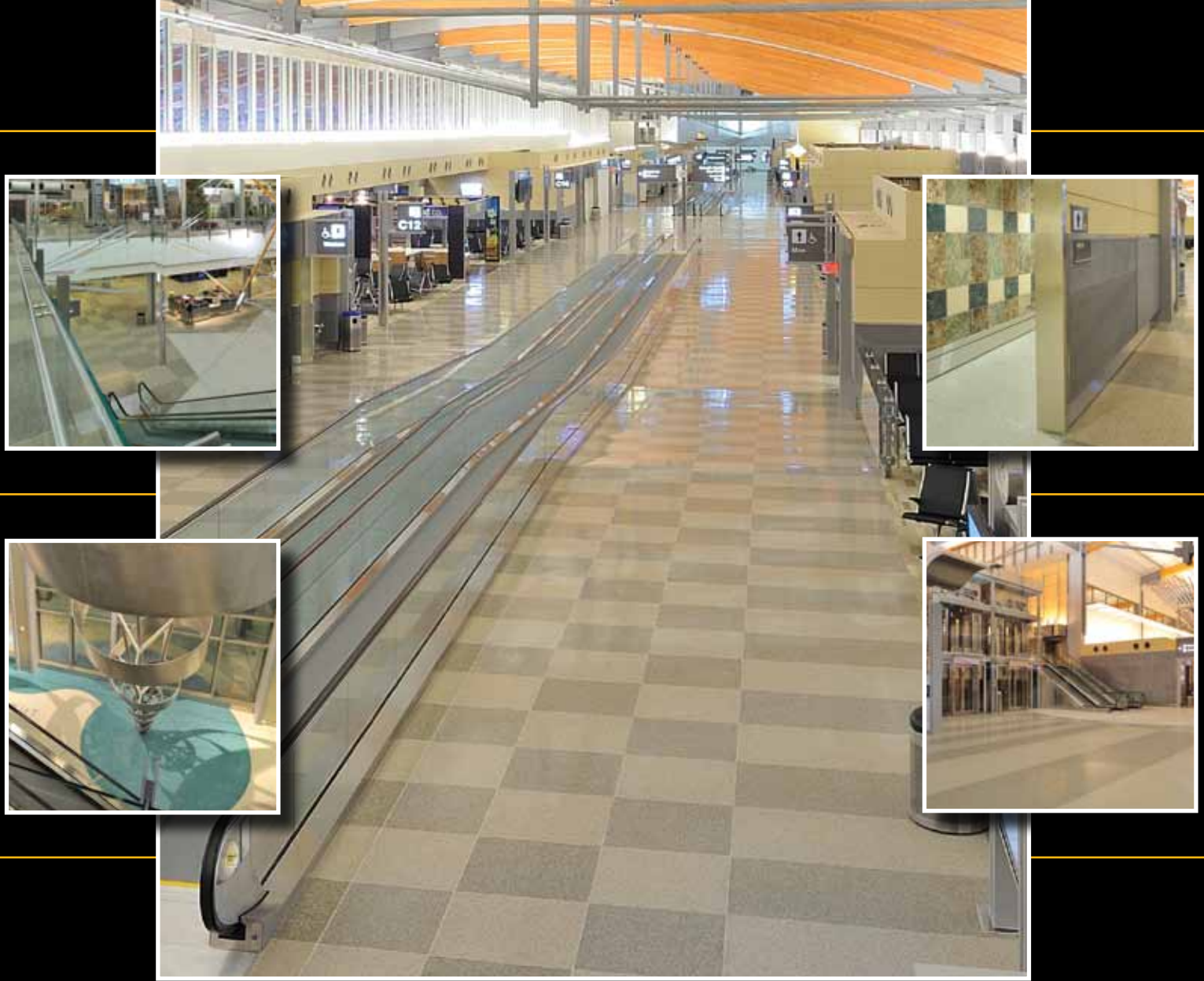

Raleigh Durham International Airport (Renovation & Expansion) – Raleigh, NC

This airport design was inspired by the theme “hand-made and mind-made,” intertwining the region’s landscape, heritage and economy throughout. A quilt pattern woven into the epoxy terrazzo pays homage to the textile industry of the area. Soothing earth-tone colors complement the terminal’s vast wood beams and open spaces. In the baggage claim, an indoor-outdoor art piece brings nature into the building, with a large oak tree and embedded glass emblems extending through a large glass exterior wall.

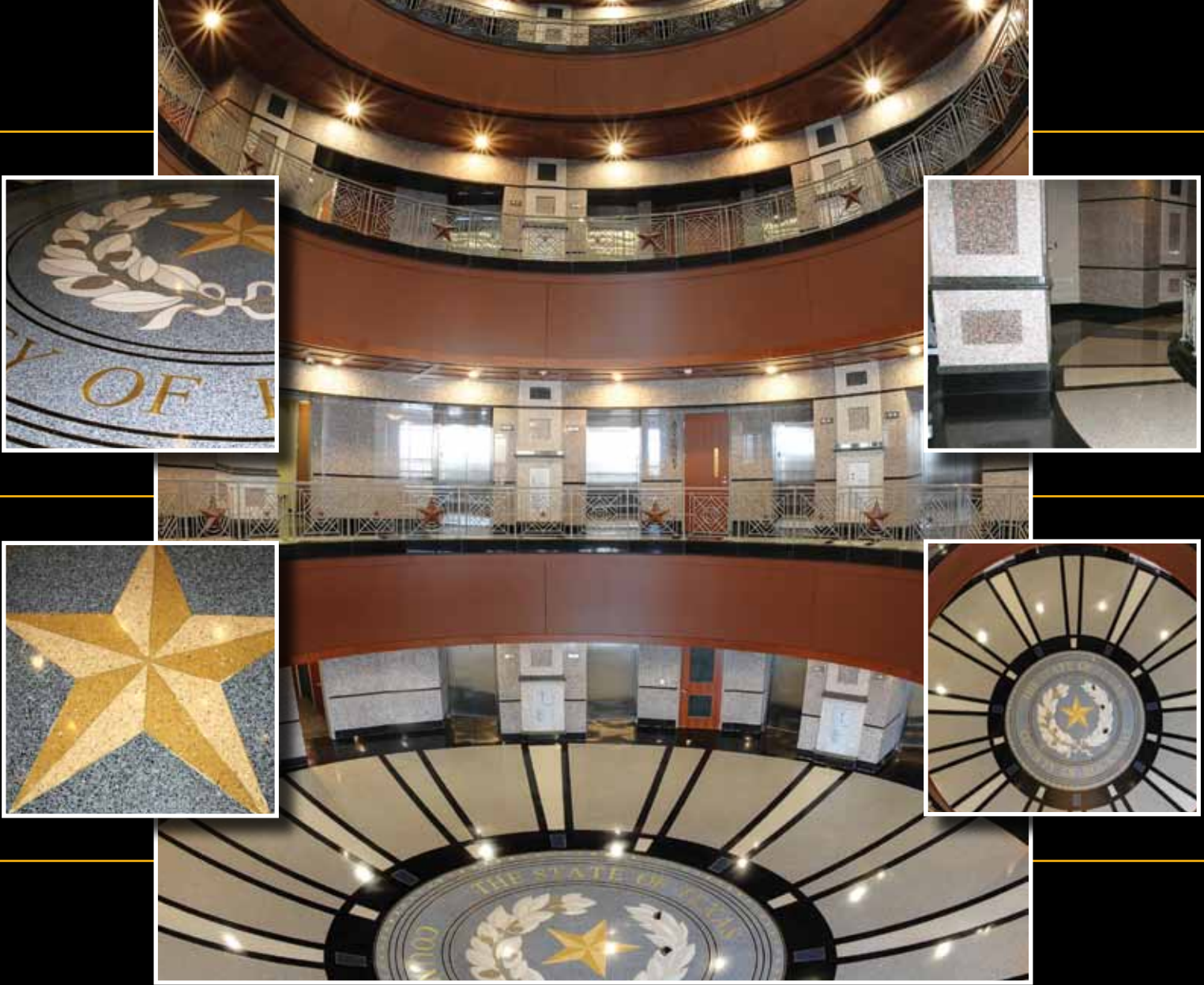

Rockwall County Courthouse – Rockwall, TX

For this new courthouse building, county officials requested timeless finishes. The design team replaced the original idea of granite flooring with terrazzo for a seamless surface. The focal point of structure's six-color pattern over four floors is a 16' diameter, nine-color county seal on the first level that can be viewed from all floors above. Its colors inspired the design of the building's original painted murals.

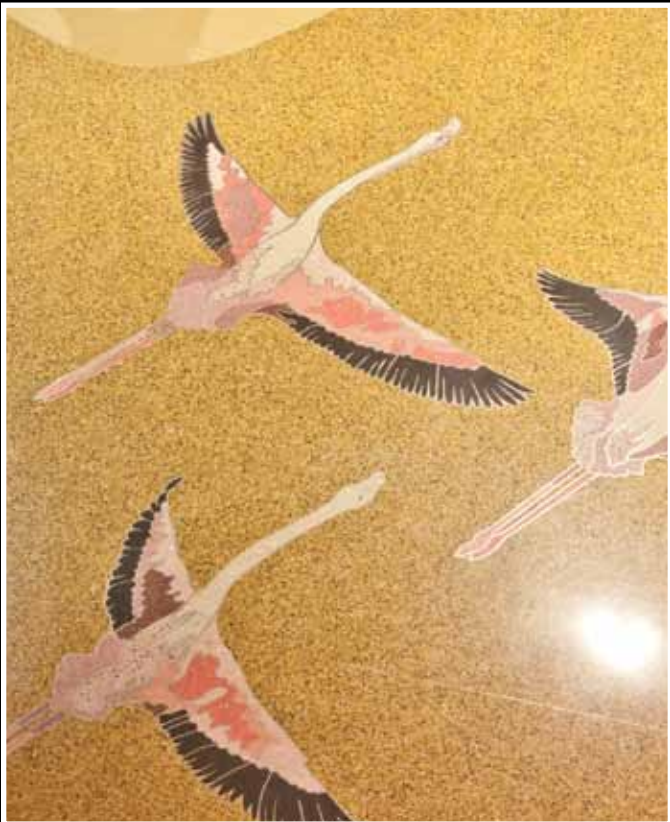

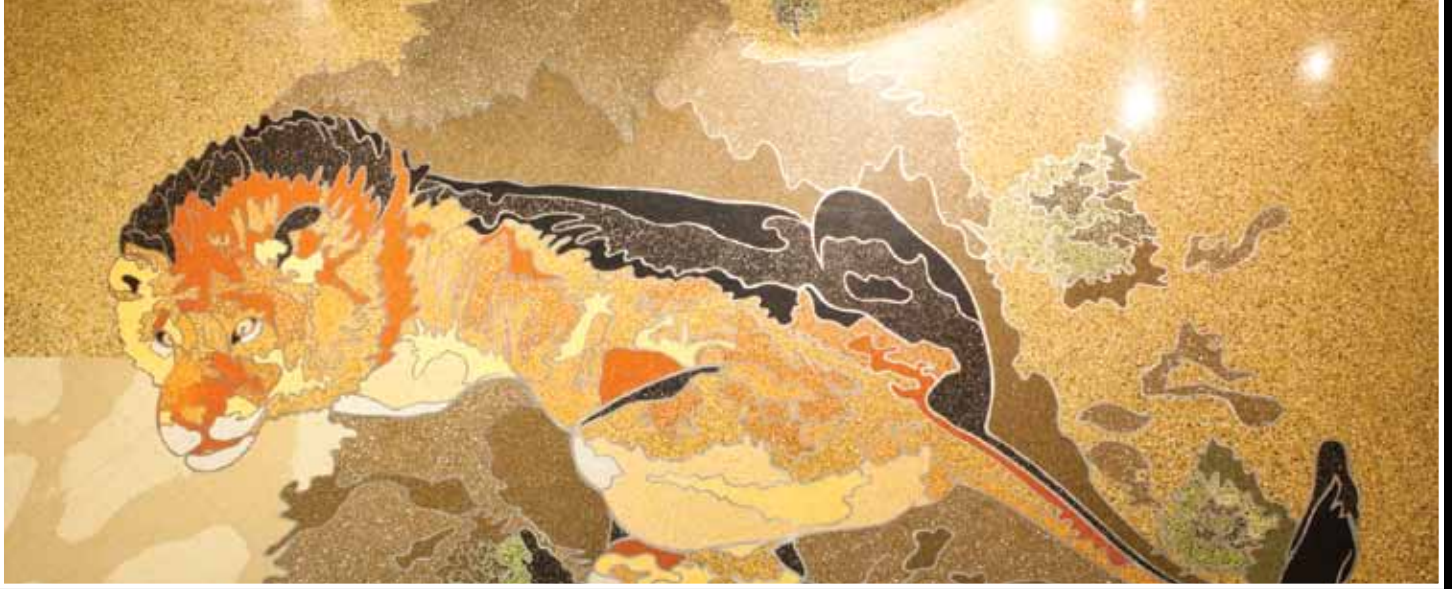

Job of the Year Kalahari Resort – Wisconsin Dells, WI

This terrazzo floor is a destination in itself, as its stunning visuals transport resort guests to the Dark Continent. Installed over an existing stained concrete floor, which had been a constant challenge to maintain, epoxy terrazzo was specified for its design capabilities, durability and ease of maintenance. A giraffe herd, a male lion, bull elephants, a flock of flamingoes, and zebras in motion, all life-sized, are depicted in their natural habitats, using over 40 colors of tinted resin combined with marble aggregates, clear resin, torpedo sand, glass, and mother-of-pearl. From a 29-foot compass featuring a breathtaking elephant at each of its points ushering guests into the lobby, to wind-swept desert sand recreated in shades of terrazzo, to a river rock bed pathway guiding guests through the lobby, it is a floor like no other.

Rocky Creek Elementary School – Lexington, SC

This school was designed with the goals of promoting collaborative learning and meeting LEED Silver Certification requirements. Using thin-set epoxy terrazzo for both sustainability and design flexibility, the terrazzo contractor collaborated closely with the architect to create this 25,590-square-foot artistic rendering of the surrounding landscape. Nature comes indoors with the free form image of a meandering blue stream running through the corridors, brightened with recycled glass and mirror aggregates, with splashes of natural earth tones reminiscent of creek banks. In the center commons area, a grand compass directs young explorers.

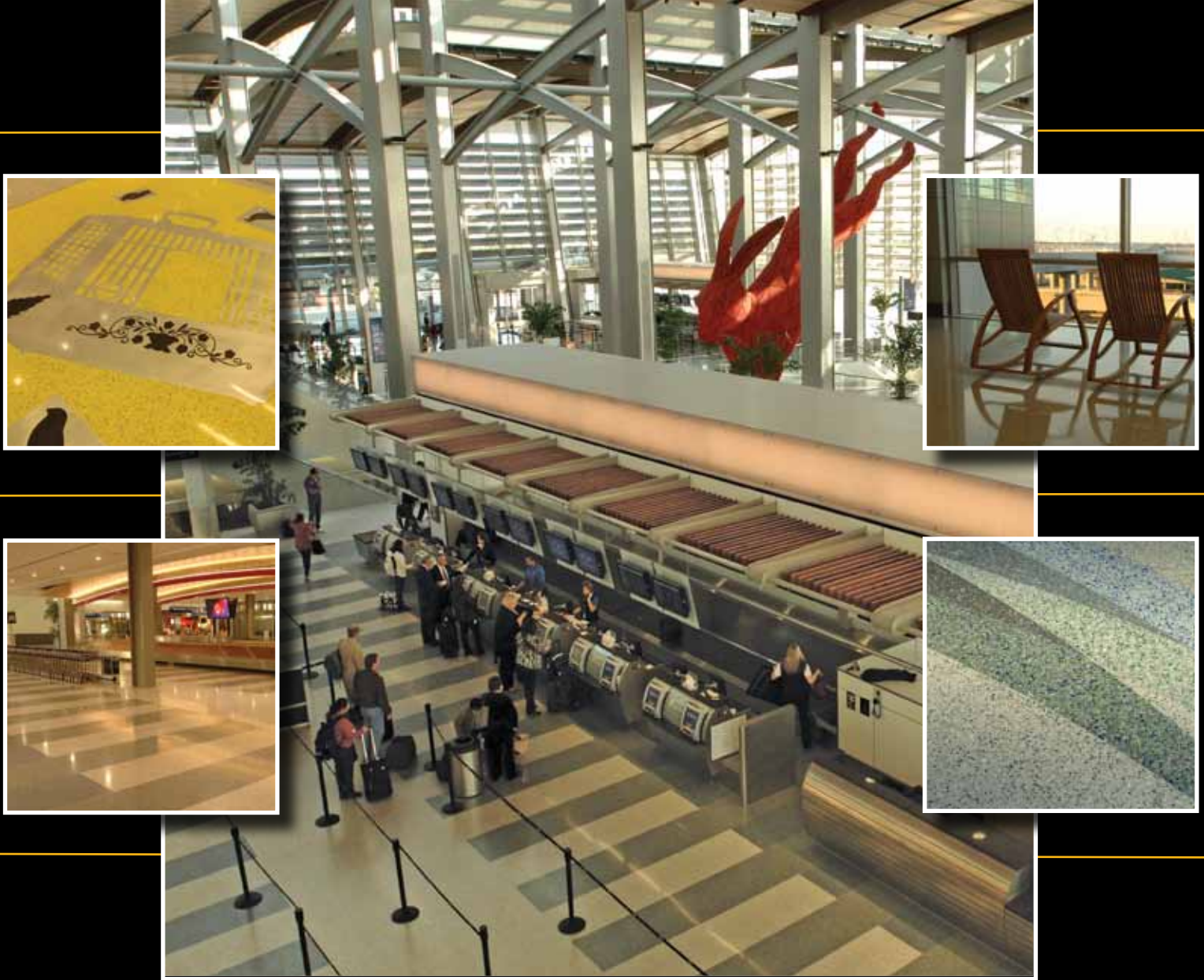

Sacramento International Airport – Sacramento, CA

Fourteen colors of terrazzo in this LEED-certified terminal are formulated with natural marble and mother-of-pearl. High percentages of recycled glass reinforce the terminal's green theme, both in color and sustainability. Illustrated throughout the airport, 1,000 water-jet cut letters, set in the terrazzo, tell the story of the city and its landscapes. Every indigenous bird in the area is represented, as are prominent local citizens. All four outer walls of this airport are glass from floor to ceiling, so natural light shines exactly as the architect envisioned: on the gleaming terrazzo floor.

Florida First District Court of Appeal – Tallahassee, FL

This LEED Gold Certified building is designed to emulate early 20th-century courthouses. The poured-in-place epoxy terrazzo with its classically derived pattern reinforces and unifies the traditional architecture of the structure. Highlighting the dramatic space of the circular lobby are alternating black-and-white diamond shaped terrazzo panels, increasing in size as they radiate out from the cast bronze State Seal of Florida centered in the floor.

Logan International Airport: Terminal B Common Area Improvements – Boston, MA

Terrazzo was an easy choice for this project based on its long life cycle and ease of maintenance. Terrazzo has now replaced carpet, slate, and porcelain tile in all four of the airport's terminals, where it endures considerable abuse, but is easily maintained in mint condition. An eight-color palette of three-eighths-inch epoxy terrazzo mixes bright accent colors with neutrals, with airplane images and conceptual graphic skyline silhouettes on the departure level, and graphic icons in a local theme in the arrivals level.

The Smith Center of Performing Arts – Las Vegas, NV

This state-of-the-art performing arts theatre with an open-air feel is a showcase of functional art, from the ground up, with terrazzo as the feature finish. The theater logo is displayed in zinc divider strips and water-jet cut squares throughout, from the sloped auditorium floor to the floors of 57 boxes of seating on four levels. Poured-in-place risers connect the rows of upper-level seating; precast stairs connect all levels. Geometric designs were used in the lobbies depicting a chevron design visible from all floors above.

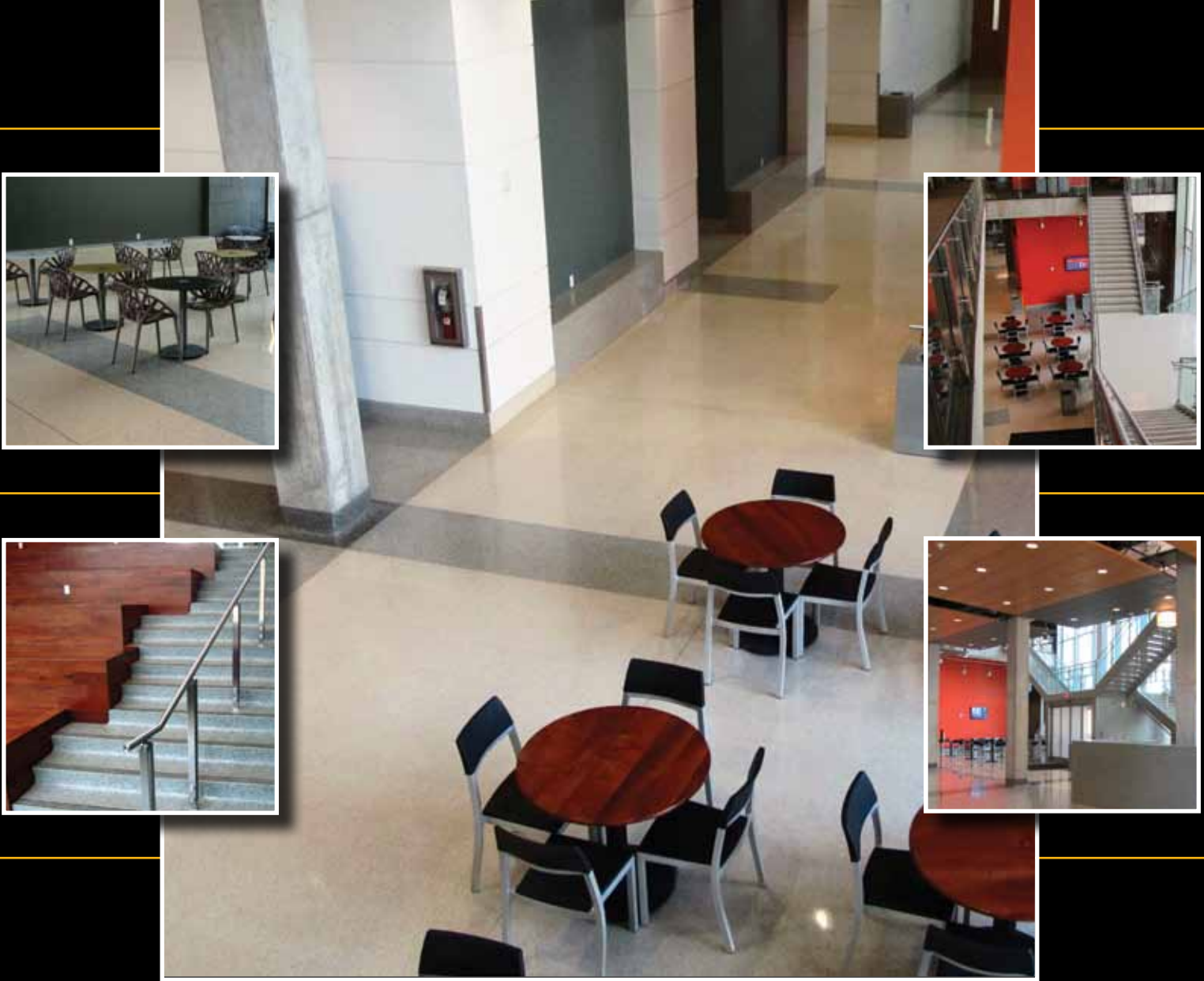

University of Texas Student Activity Center – Austin, TX

When stained concrete was originally specified for the new 150,000 square foot student activity center, the owner quickly demanded terrazzo in the 20,000 square feet of public space because of its aesthetic value, ease of maintenance and durability. Public seating areas incorporate 1,000 square feet of poured-in-place terrazzo benches and walls that created a work space environment. Dimension for the vertical surfaces ranged in height from 4 to 6 feet. The addition of the benches and workspaces added to the classic presentation of the terrazzo floor.

Special Award - Craftsmanship

The challenge met here was to replicate original terrazzo colors and to recreate the master workmanship in century-old vertical terrazzo staircases, with ADA compliance. Beyond duplicating treads, risers and stringers, the stairways needed rounded corners with a continuous balustrade, three stories tall. The balustrade was to be recessed with a nine-inch rounded cap to form the continuous spiral from floor to floor. These new staircases are indistinguishable from the original terrazzo throughout the school.

The History Colorado Museum – Denver, CO

Special Award - Art

This unique public art project is a literal and to-scale topographical map of Colorado on the museum's lobby floor. Its medium is epoxy resin with a multitude of formulated terrazzo aggregates and recycled glass mixes in a 14- color palette. The map consists of 266 individually designed panels, each poured by the artist off-site, without divider strips and with perfect registration. This terrazzo-by-number process puts terrazzo in the artist's hands for any design conceivable.
